

A Message from our Executive Director, Beth Stokes

The November holidays remind us of the importance of giving back, modeled by members of San Francisco's Interfaith Council. Every November for the past 29 years ECS has partnered with the San Francisco Interfaith Council to launch the Interfaith Winter Shelter, in which local congregations open their doors to provide nightly shelter and meals to roughly 650 homeless men from late November until the end of March.

Beginning with the National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week (Nov. 10-18), San Franciscan congregations, including the First Unitarian Universalist Church, St. Boniface Catholic Church, St. Mark's Lutheran Church, and St. Mary's Cathedral, will open their doors to provide several weeks of nightly shelter in their facilities. Also displaying a spirit of giving back, 50 congregations and community groups will show up with 2,340 home-cooked dinners for highly vulnerable people who would otherwise face hunger, exposure to cold or rainy weather, and increased risk of illness or death.

ECS is grateful to the hosting congregations, the SF Interfaith Council, and the hundreds of community members who volunteer their time, skills and resources to assist those struggling to stay warm, dry, and fed during San Francisco's rainy months. Their help—and yours—is needed to shelter 4,350 individuals exposed to the elements because they lack sufficient shelter and resources.

ECS's volunteer program is thriving. In the last year, ECS engaged over 2,200 volunteers last year, giving 25,000 hours of service. For nonprofits with limited resources, volunteers form the backbone of programs by augmenting the capacity of staff to deliver critical services to individuals in need.

Heading up the volunteer effort at ECS is Amar Al Hosani. For Amar, volunteering provides a sense of belonging not only for the isolated homeless population that ECS serves, but for the corporate and community partners seeking to make a tangible difference in their local community. "We all have a stake in a future where all individuals are able to reach their full potential and thrive in an equitable and inclusive San Francisco." In this way, ECS's volunteer program helps to bridge the gap between San Francisco's diverse communities.

Amar is spearheading ECS's holiday drive. This annual event is an opportunity for ECS to celebrate with those who may not have a loved one nearby during the holiday season. In total, ECS hopes to distribute close to 2,500 presents to ECS residents. Depending on the current housing situation of individuals and families, gifts will include coats and jackets for senior center participants, bath towels and comforter sets for those in permanent supportive housing, and personal care items like toothbrushes and shampoo for guests in shelters and navigation centers.
